

BATCHELOR COLLEGE LOGO

The Batchelor College logo arose out of a College-wide competition held in 1986. The winning design was the work of Isobel Windy, at that time a Teacher Education student from Central Australia.

The logo combines elements from both Centralian and Top End art motifs symbolising the coming together of Aboriginal people. The original drawing, stylised to form the logo, represents four people sitting around a camp fire telling stories to each other and in so doing, sharing knowledge.

The College logo uses the Aboriginal colours. The symbolic meaning of the colours of the Logo are -

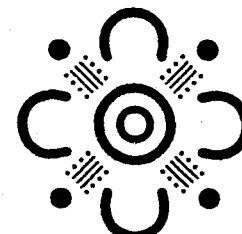
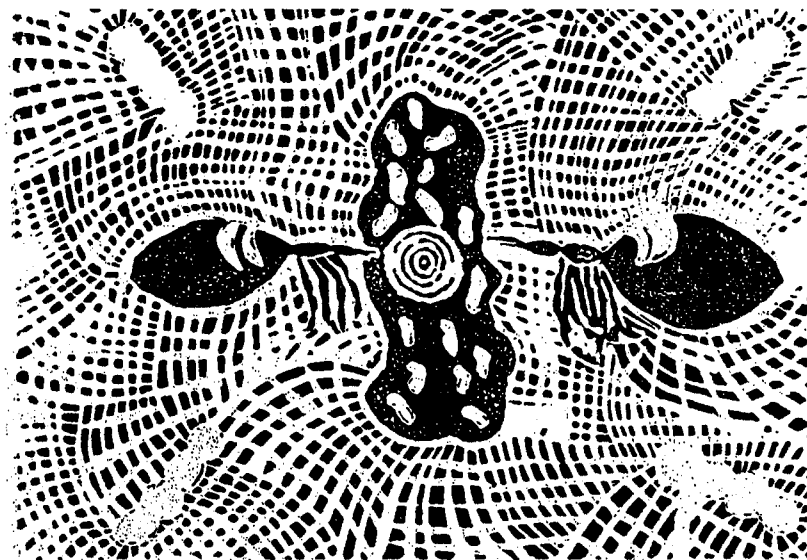
- Black represents the Aboriginal people, past, present, future;

- Red represents the earth, red ochre, and spiritual relationship to the land.

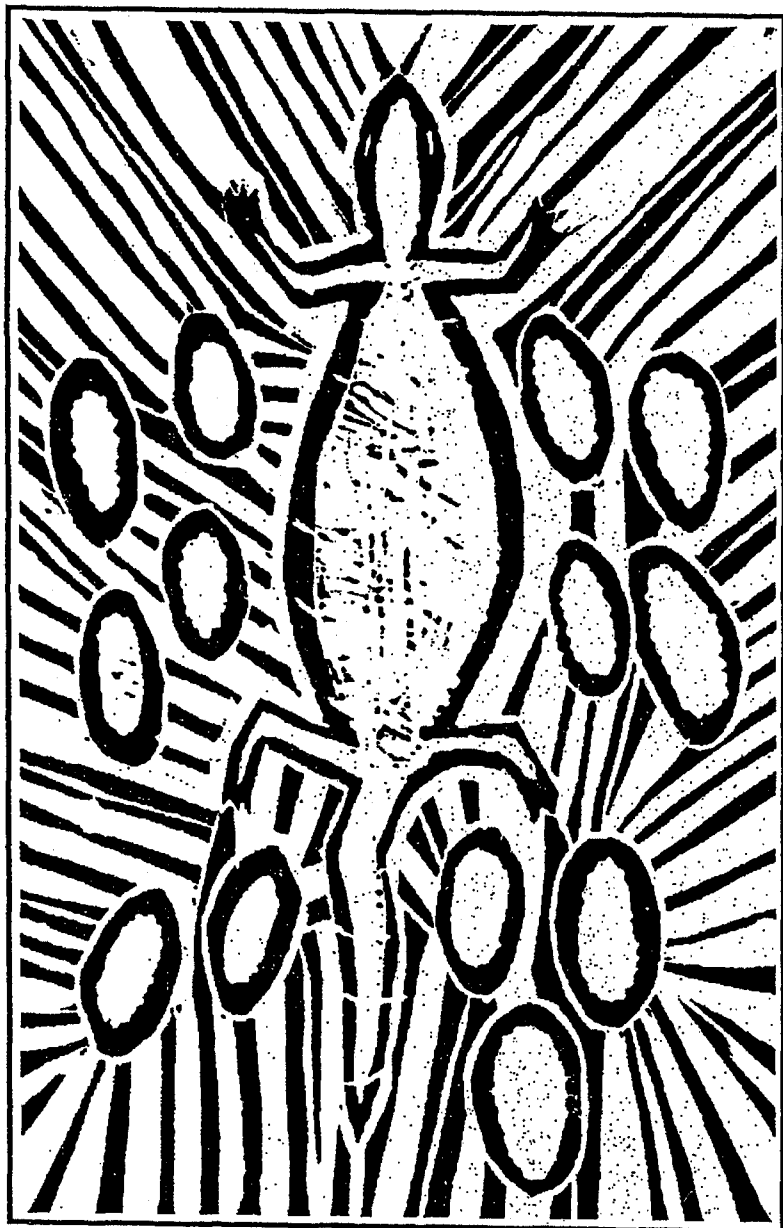

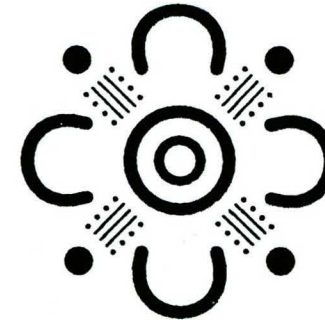

BATCHELOR COLLEGE

Batchelor College is a multipurpose Institute of Tertiary Education specialising in the provision of accredited courses of professional and para-professional education and training for Aboriginal people from remote and traditionally orientated communities in the Northern Territory and elsewhere.

The College's operations are centred in the township of Batchelor located 100km south of Darwin. The College began as a small annex to Kormilda College in the mid-1960's providing short programs for Aboriginal teacher aides and assistants in community schools. In 1974 the College was relocated from Darwin to the township of Batchelor and was shifted within the town to its present site in 1982. During 1990, in recognition of the educational needs of Aboriginal people from Central Australia, a second campus of the College was established in Alice Springs. Later in the same year, annexes were opened at Nhulunbuy, Katherine and Tennant Creek.

Over the last decade the College has expanded and diversified as a response to the importance Aboriginal people have placed on gaining accredited awards in areas of professional and para-professional occupation. From an enrolment of approximately 100 students in 1985 studying in the only program on offer, the College today has an enrolment in excess of 960 students from over 200 communities studying more than 25 different courses.

The close links between the College and Aboriginal communities have led to the development of a mixed-mode of course delivery. Most of the programs operate through this mixed-mode combining community-based studies and work experience with short intensive workshops at Batchelor or in other regional locations.

Two principles underpin all aspects of the life of the College. The College adopts a "both-ways" approach to cultural interaction and cross-cultural learnings as it brings together the Aboriginal traditions of knowledge with Western academic ideals. It affirms through its work and through the courses it offers, the aspiration to self-determination held by Aboriginal people.

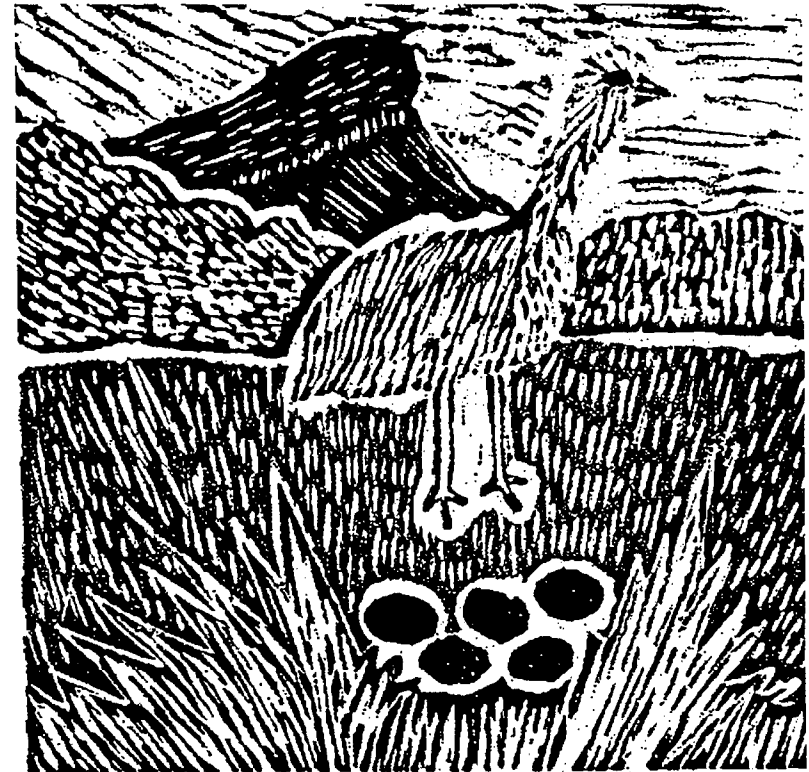
